## Senate Bill (SB) 568 Senator Paul Bettencourt



## **Reforming Special Education Funding**

SB 568 would significantly alter the delivery of special education funding in Texas. It would transition the finance method from a placement-based system to a service intensity-based model, ensuring resources are allocated based on student needs. The bill would also establish grant programs to serve students with autism or dyslexia, as well as a program to increase the number of qualified and appropriately-credentialed special education staff. SB 568 would increase financial support to school districts for full and individual initial evaluations.



The rising demand for special education services has led to severe challenges across
Texas. Fort Bend ISD, whose special education students make up 14% of its student population, faced a \$33.6 million shortfall in state and federal special education funding. Round Rock ISD noted a 25% increase in special education enrollment over five years.



In 2021, lawmakers
established the Texas
Commission on Special
Education Funding to study
methods of financing special
education in public schools.
The bipartisan body issued a
report to the Legislature in
December 2022, which
included a number of
recommendations. SB 568
seeks to enact more than half
of those recommendations.
